The role of P/CHWs

Who are promotores/community health workers and what is their role within the healthcare ecosystem?

According to the CDC, a Community Health Worker is defined as a frontline public health worker who is a trusted member or has a particularly good understanding of the community served.

Similarly, according to the American Public Health Association, a Community Health Worker is defined as a frontline public health worker who is a trusted member of and/or has an unusually close understanding of the community served.






VCN Background

First of its kind!

- A comprehensive training program for Community Health Workers (CHWs)/ Promotores de Salud who want to build their communities' confidence in, and access to, vaccines.
- Piloted with 200+ Promotores & Community Health Workers and Instructors in Texas in March – April 2022
- Launched nationally February 2023



Program Goals

- Increase P/CHW confidence in talking about vaccines and navigating people to vaccination services
- Increase P/CHW knowledge of vaccines and vaccine-preventable diseases
- Create culturally and linguistically appropriate resources and tools for P/CHWs to encourage vaccination in their communities/networks
- Provide an online space for P/CHWs to share resources, experiences, and insights
- Increase vaccine uptake through the use of P/CHWs as trusted messengers
- Address technology barriers for P/CHWs by offering in-person facilitation




VCN Nationwide Launch: Data Collection

- Surveys and quizzes assessed participants' capacity, measured as knowledge and self-reported confidence prior to and immediately following the training.
- Pre- and post-tests were conducted for each training module to assess learning using a combination of multiple choice and true/false questions.
- Paired t-tests were used to assess the statistical significance of differences in knowledge assessment.
 Percentages were determined to analyze the average self-reported confidence immediately after training.

Confidence Assessment

93% of post-course survey respondents said the courses increased their confidence in their ability to talk about vaccines and connect people to vaccination services.

Racial Discrimination and Access to Care in Colorado

Colorado Health Access Survey Findings Suggest the Need to Address Racial Discrimination in the Health Care System

OCTOBER 2022

Bias & Prejudice = **DISPARITIES**

An estimated 148,000 Colorado adults reported being treated with less respect or receiving worse care than others while seeking health care, according to data from the 2021 Colorado Health Access Survey (CHAS). Of this group, over 52,000 were people of color. Race or cultural or ethnic background were the most common reasons why people of color felt they were disrespected when accessing the health care system.

Connect with the Community

Identify Community Leaders & Create Partnerships



Identify organization leaders, influences and leaders within the community



Meet with leaders to explain and articulate goals and outcomes



Ask questions to learn about community needs and outcomes



Create partnerships and ask community leaders to promote events and activities from their personal point of view



Spanish-language TV advertisements on Telemundo

A 30-second TV ad for immigrant Latino Moms in Colorado, featuring collaborator Julissa Soto, aired 140 times on Telemundo Colorado from Aug. 1 – Dec. 12, 2023, and reached 631,000 households.

Spanish-language Radio, Digital, & Social Media

Ads posted on Denver's KBNO radio station, website, and social media accounts reached over 131,000 households in December 2023.





Targeted social media ads for Latinx moms in Colorado placed between Oct. 16 – Dec. 12, 2023 garnered **4.2 million impressions**.

Key Takeaways & Lessons Learned

- Community health workers are trusted messengers who may be instrumental in addressing immunization disparities through programs like the VCN.
- Community health workers should be routinely considered and included as part of the healthcare ecosystem as they have a direct relationship with the communities they serve.
- The VCN program successfully increased participants' vaccine knowledge and confidence. This program can easily be incorporated into professional development frameworks.
- Efforts to address immunization disparities must include authentic community engagement. Utilize the cultural validation model!

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Opportunities for Immunization Coalitions

- Coalitions can utilize the VCN to provide professional development for their members to increase their confidence when talking to community members about vaccines.
- Engage with P/CHWs in your community!



Opportunities for Immunization Coalitions

How can coalitions operationalize cultural validation?

Integrate immunization information at non-health-specific events.

WHAT ARE VACCINE SUNDAYS?

Vaccine Sundays is a project designed to provide vetted information from trusted resources to the underserved Spanish-speaking community in Colorado. The goal is to make prevention education and outreach part of the Church's ministry.

Julissa provides trusted, and vetted information on COVID-19 information that fosters preparedness rather than stoking fear and perpetuating myths. She provides information in Spanish on the signs and symptoms of COVID-19. She educates the congregation on infection prevention habits, like proper handwashing techniques and other common practices frequently taught to combat influenza. She
